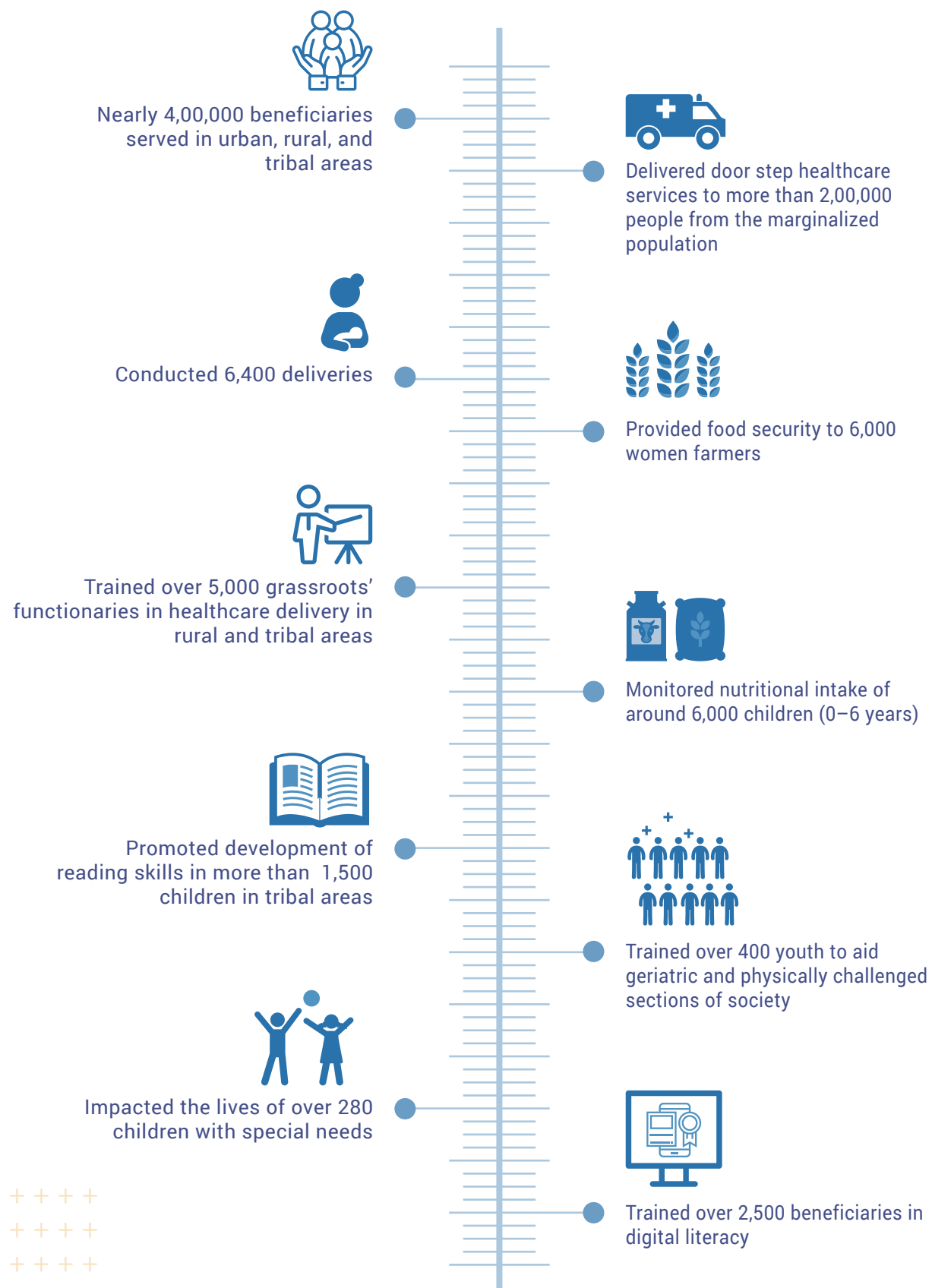


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MESSAGE FROM THE

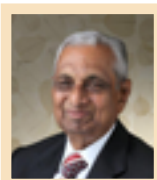

OUR DEDICATED TEAM MEMBER

“Joining the Foundation as an outreach worker was a turning point of my life. It was a crucial time for me where I had to manage my five months old baby and work. The Foundation team gave me all the support and flexibility to balance my professional and personal life.

My main goal was to work towards the empowerment of villagers, especially women. My passion was encouraged and I started vocational training for village health-workers so that the women could get some additional income.

In a short span of time, my dedication was recognized and I started getting rewarded and promoted periodically. I then started working for Safe Motherhood and Child Survival project as a block coordinator in the year 2004. Gradually, my self-confidence increased and I learnt to drive a motor bike in order to cover the remote tribal villages often even without an approach road.

20 years ago, I was a just an outreach worker and now I am the Coordinator for the Skills and Capacity Building Division of the Foundation, supporting a tribal population of seven lacs. Two years ago, I completed my lifelong dream of achieving a Master’s degree in Social Work. I have also completed a one-year correspondence course in “Rural Management in NGO”. I want to further sharpen my English and computer skills. I am 100% certain that the Deepak Foundation family will help me fulfill all of my dreams as it has done before.

I have a long way to go, and I look forward to my journey of 20 more years with Deepak Foundation.”



KAILASH

A HUMANITARIAN TRIBAL
FEMALE CEO

Kailash is a 38 years old woman living in the tribal area of Kawant, Gujarat. She started her journey as a village health worker with Deepak Foundation in 2004. She then worked as an ASHA with the Government of India. She ensured that her village adopts sustainable agriculture practices via the Foundation's Mahila Kisan Sashaktikaran Pariyojana project.

In the past 14 years, no maternal deaths have been reported in the village where she served as an ASHA. She has won the best ASHA award of her block six times.

She became the first CEO of Vanbandhu Mahila Khet Producer Company Ltd of her block in 2016. During her tenure, she has motivated around 3,000 tribal women farmers and also helped them in getting minimum support prices for their agricultural produce and reduce waste.

"My family and I have benefitted immensely from Deepak Foundation's continued interventions. Our agricultural production has doubled from 10-12 quintals in 2016 to 25 quintals now. We have started growing crops in two seasons versus one season and have also started growing a variety of crops; bengalgram and soyabean along with paddy, maize, cotton, and pigeonpea. Our agricultural income has increased four folds over the last decade. We now live in a pukka house, own a motorcycle, and also an android phone."

MADHU GAMETI

A SUPPORTIVE WIFE, GUTSY
MOTHER, AND AN EMPOWERED
ASHA

Madhu, the youngest one in the family, had a very pampered and protected childhood. Unfortunately, post-marriage, her in-laws threw Madhu and her husband out of the house.

Madhu stepped up as a supportive wife and took up labor work with her husband. She was also pregnant at the time. Because of their weak financial condition and lack of awareness about healthcare, she delivered a baby boy at home. Two years later, she delivered twin babies.

Her husband lost both his legs in an accident at work. She continued to work as a labourer to fulfill the family's needs and ensure her children's education.

She has been working as an ASHA since 2009. Today, she takes care of her children, her disabled husband, and has managed to bring her family out of poverty by doing excellent work as an ASHA. She has committed her life to help the village people by providing proper healthcare. She counsels families and encourages institutional deliveries which in return decreases maternal/infant mortality rate. She educates them about the new government schemes which encourage utilization of healthcare services.

COMPREHENSIVE EMERGENCY OBSTETRIC AND NEWBORN CARE UNIT

Initiated as a Public Private Partnership (PPP) model in partnership with Government of Gujarat, Deepak Foundation has been successfully operating the 80-bedded Comprehensive Emergency Obstetric and Newborn Care (CEmONC) unit at Jabugam since 2006. The success has helped the Foundation to replicate the operations of CEmONC unit at tribal areas of Madhya Pradesh (2016) and Jharkhand (2017).

CEmONC is a global strategy to improve the maternal and child survival and overall health. The CEmONC units provide affordable, equitable, and accessible healthcare services to the deprived, remote, and tribal communities. CEmONC units are designed to handle the complicated and high-risk deliveries with availability of specialist doctors and nursing staff round the clock.



STORY OF CHANGE

PATIENT PROFILE: *Jigisha Kolcha delivered a preterm baby at 28th week of gestation.*
LOCATION: *Pavi Jetpur village of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat*

Due to a preterm delivery, the baby was admitted in the newborn stabilization unit of CEmONC for 25 days. For the first two days, the baby was on nil-by-mouth plan of care and was kept on oxygen prongs and intravenous fluid. Gradually, minimal enteral feeding was initiated. However, the baby was not showing significant weight gain even after 15 days. The baby was then fed fortified human milk.

Once the baby's condition stabilized, he was discharged on July 8, 2017 with a weight of 1.14 kg. During discharge, Jigisha was given proper counselling on breast-feeding and kangaroo mother care. Regular perinatal care check-up was done for Jigisha and her baby to monitor their condition. During the subsequent visits, the baby showed steady increase in weight. At present both mother and baby are healthy.



DE-ADDICTION CENTRE



Deepak Foundation has taken up an initiative of establishing a de-addiction centre with a vision of providing counselling and rehabilitation services for the people addicted to alcoholism and substance abuse in urban areas of Hyderabad. Apart from the institutional services, the centre also focuses on community processes and sensitizes the urban slums and underprivileged masses about substance abuse and its ill effects. Referral services to higher centres are arranged and the referred beneficiaries are closely followed-up to ensure compliance and completion of treatment. The centre also supports the addicted/rehabilitated beneficiaries by providing skills building and vocational trainings for income generation and rehabilitation in the society.

CITIZEN'S HELP DESK AND MEDICAL BUGGY AT SSG HOSPITAL



Deepak Foundation, in partnership with Deepak Nitrite and Department of Health and Family Welfare, has been operating a tailor-made information kiosk help desk since 2006. Help desk aims to facilitate timely services to critical cases referred from various regions. It has been upgraded with information display monitors which further reduces the waiting and enquiry time at the help desk. Help desk focuses on the following aspects:

- + Round the clock assistance and guidance to emergency cases at SSG hospital
- + Counselling and guidance on family planning services, maternal and child benefit schemes, and other welfare schemes
- + Assistance for blood/diagnostic tests

MOBILE HEALTH UNIT



Historically, the accessibility to healthcare in rural and tribal areas has been low. To address this gap, Deepak Foundation initiated the Mobile Health Unit (MHU) services, focusing on underserved rural and tribal areas.

With support of CSR and government partners, Deepak Foundation is currently operating 12 MHUs in Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand, and Maharashtra. With a motive of universal health coverage and provision of basic healthcare needs, the MHUs provide outpatient consultations at people's doorsteps making it cost effective by reducing consultation and transportation costs for the beneficiaries. Emphasis is laid on preventive health services through periodic health camps for screening and referrals.

SELF HELP GROUP MANAGEMENT AND CATTLE-CARE PROJECT



Training women on Self Help Group (SHG) management and cattle-care program was initiated in the year 2017-18 in two villages; Sankhej and Dharoda villages of Kheda block, Kheda district, Gujarat. This program was supported by ONGC and envisaged to empower 300 women by building and upgrading their skills in SHG management-leading to financial independence, credit availability, and income generation. The training also helped build their capacities in good cattle care practices.

315 women were trained on SHG management. 25 SHGs were revived and nine new SHGs (against a target of five) were formed. The collective annual savings of these SHGs sum up to a total of Rs. 8,16,000. Five SHGs received income-generating fund from the government for their credit operations, since their savings and record-keeping was regular and properly maintained. 329 women were trained in cattle care. The average monthly milk supplied by a beneficiary per month increased by 24% to 145 litres. The average monthly income of each woman trainee pouring milk in the dairy cooperatives increased from Rs. 4,470 to Rs. 6,851. The average fat content in the milk was increased to 4.4%, which is 1.4% more than the ideal fat content levels. The recent average profit percentage for the village dairy cooperatives increased to 12.2%, which is 2.2% more than the ideal profit levels for a dairy cooperative.

The project has been instrumental in transforming gender roles with respect to dairy activities. It is now women who go for supplying milk in the dairies as opposed to the men. Earlier, women were confined to milking cattle. This shows a positive change in the village communities and is a step towards women empowerment.

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STORY OF CHANGE



PROFILE: Malti, 54 years old widow
LOCATION: Sankhej village, Kheda district
PROGRAM: Training on basic orientation of SHGs and cattle care practices

Malti was part of a SHG which had been non-functional for a long time. Her only source of livelihood was a buffalo through which she earned about Rs. 3,000 per month by milk pouring to dairy cooperatives.

With cattle care training, she learnt the benefits of clean surroundings for the buffalo, importance of vaccination and artificial insemination, cattle feed, mineral mixture, and knowledge pertaining to minimum requirement of water for her buffalo. After adopting the learnt practices, she noticed an increase in the milk producing capacity of her cattle and her earnings doubled to Rs. 5,500 to 6,000 per month. Her average milk pouring increased to 9 litres/day for which she won the first prize in the competition organized by Deepak Foundation.

PRADHAN MANTRI FASAL BIMA YOJNA



Pradhan Mantri Fasal Bima Yojna (PMFBY) facilitation project was initiated in the year 2017-18 in 40 villages of Naswadi block of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat. It reaches out to 7500 tribal farmers as beneficiaries. The goal of the project is to increase insurance cover & financial support to the vulnerable farmers in the event of failure of any crop due to any natural calamities, pests, diseases, etc., and make crop insurance claim settlement process easier.

Deepak Foundation has been successful in achieving the goal of the project by conducting 14 intensive campaigns on PMFBY with 3000 farmers through training workshops for farmers, and training workshops for farmers registered groups, office bearers, and staff. These workshops have been instrumental in orienting farmers on effects of natural calamities, pests, and diseases on agriculture, and disseminating new and improved practices of cultivation amongst beneficiaries.

The Foundation has involved women and cooperative society members in planning and implementation of project.

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PROMOTION OF FARMER PRODUCER ORGANISATIONS



Initiated in 2017 in partnership with NABARD, Promotion of Farmer Producer Organisations (FPOs), helps the formation and registration of FPOs, conducts trainings for capacity-building, provides support to different FPO functionaries, and nurtures the FPOs by providing necessary hand-holding support towards maturity for a minimum period of three years.

FPO project is being implemented with 700 marginalized tribal women farmers organised in 35 Farmer Producer Groups (FPGs) in 20 villages of Kawant and Naswadi block, Chhota Udepur district in Gujarat. The project is expected to enhance the capacity of the agricultural community by bringing together few lead farmers, Board of Directors, and CEOs of FPOs.

CLIMATE PROOFING INTERVENTIONS



Climate Proofing Interventions (CPI) project was initiated in the year 2017-18 in five villages Mankodi, Narukot, Bordha, Undva, and Baladgam within the tribal block of Kawant of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat. The program is supported by NABARD, and includes 900 tribal farmers as beneficiaries. This program is a public-private partnership towards climate change adaptation and mitigation in rural areas of India.

The initiative is envisaged to integrate watershed development activities towards the rehabilitation of degraded soils, and building climate resilience by improving adaptive capacities of the communities against the changing climate in the proposed area of 1,205 hectares of watershed areas.



WATER CONSERVATION PROJECT

Water conservation project was initiated in the year 2017-18 in two villages, Nesda and Tarvada, which lie in the Gujarat Industrial Development Corporation (GIDC) area of Panchmahal district, Gujarat. The project is supported by TOTO, Japan and includes 150 households consisting of 200 farmers. The programme is envisaged to sensitize village farmers on water and methods of conservation, and to increase the green cover in the villages. It aims to demonstrate increased water accessibility for irrigation in three villages through community-managed farm ponds, and generating awareness on green environment through plantation.

Under this project, five SHGs are running successfully with a collective annual saving of Rs. 60,000. A group of 30 farmers each have been trained on water conservation and a 9,900 square metre farm pond has been constructed in Nesda village with community support, which is expected to provide drinking and irrigation facilities to 250 beneficiaries.

HOME HEALTH AIDE COURSE



Deepak Foundation is affiliated with the Healthcare Sector Skill Council (HSSC) and National Skill Development Corporation (NSDC) through which it conducts nationally approved Home Health Aide (HHA) course in Hyderabad, Telangana and in Vadodara and Chhota Udepur districts, Gujarat.

The Foundation is also a Vocational Training Provider under the Gujarat Council of Vocational Training (GCVT) to conduct courses under the National Urban Livelihood Mission. **HHA trains individuals from rural, tribal, and urban areas to work as caretakers in clinics, nursing homes, old age homes, and multi-specialty hospitals. The three-month certificate course provides the youth with essential skills required in this field, and thereby helps them avail better employment opportunities.** The course not only provides with internship opportunities, but also ensures placement of all the trainees.

ACCREDITED SOCIAL HEALTH ACTIVISTS TRAINING



Since 2006, Deepak Foundation is working towards capacity building of rural and urban Accredited Social Health Activists (ASHAs) with Department of Health and Family Welfare. The Foundation conducts trainings of ASHAs in eight districts of Gujarat. Participatory nature of our trainings enables ASHAs to build existing knowledge, and develop new skills in the area of maternal and child healthcare.

The trainings have enhanced the skills of ASHAs and ASHA facilitators in:

- + Home-based new born care
- + Identification and referral of common illness
- + Monitoring and support

In 2017-18, the Foundation expanded the ASHA capacity building to Jobat block in Alirajpur district, Madhya Pradesh where ASHAs were trained on Mother and Child Tracking System (MCTS). The Foundation trained the ASHAs to facilitate timely collection of data and support the Auxiliary Nurse Midwifery (ANMs) so that their services can be reached to maximum number of beneficiaries.



STORY OF CHANGE

NAME: Urvashi Panchal
COURSE: Home Health Aide, 3 months

20 years old, Urvashi Panchal hails from a poor socio-economic background. Her father works in a hardware shop and her mother is a housewife. Urvashi's dream was to have a respectable job in a clinical setting. However, due to lack of confidence and knowledge of nursing, she was unable to clear job interviews.

Urvashi learnt about the HHA course from an ASHA worker in her village and enrolled for the course where she learnt about basic patient care techniques such as measuring blood pressure, blood sugar, moving and lifting patient, nasal feeding etc. During the course, she was given practical exposure through visits to various hospitals and also an internship. HHA course aided in her overall personality development by helping her learn basics of English and making her digitally literate.

After successfully completing the course, she interned with Uday clinic in Vadodara and is now employed there with a monthly income of Rs. 8,000/-.

MOBILE LIBRARY

Deepak Foundation initiated a pilot of mobile library services in 25 tribal villages of Roha block in Raigad district, Maharashtra. Mobile library provides book-based learning to both school-going and dropout children in the community. Through storytelling and recitation, mobile library services help in improving the reading, writing, cognitive skills development, and building confidence. Skilled and educated storytellers are identified from the local community and trained. They are then provided with a set of storybooks based on Panchatantra, procured from various agencies.

The project provides a conducive environment encouraging peer learning, which not only induces interest in reading and writing, but also inculcates a habit of self-learning among children. Mobile library provides a flexible environment for learning where a child is not restricted to receiving knowledge depending on his age, but is free to develop learning different disciplines as per his level of comprehension of concepts. This method of teaching challenges the standardization of milestones of learning. Furthermore, this initiative also addresses the issue of school dropouts helping children restart their learning process irrespective of their age and gap in school. Currently, 750 children have been enrolled to this service and are taking regular benefits of the mobile library.

PRE-SCHOOL EDUCATION- PUNE BALWADI PROJECT



Children from impoverished environment tend to reap the most dramatic transformation from early childhood programs. These children who face many health and environmental risks, in particular, need to get off to a good start in life. One way to help these children is to place them in quality early education programs. For holistic development of the children, especially those from low socio-economic background, quality preschool education delivered through pre-primary schools or 'Balwadis' is the need of the hour.

Deepak Foundation has partnered with Pune Municipal Corporation (PMC) education board to work towards strengthening of all the 468 Balwadis across 15 clusters in Pune city since 2008. It works in partnership with school board of the PMC to undertake health check-ups, referrals and treatment of advanced diseases, nutritional monitoring, developmental delay assessment, supportive supervision and capacity building of Balwadi teachers.

STORY OF CHANGE



NAME: Mohammad Dahid
AGE: Sankhej village, Kheda district
PATIENT PROFILE: Studying in junior KG class, PMC Balwadi school. Dahid had a hole in heart from birth.

Dahid belongs to socio-economically poor background. In September 2017, Deepak Foundation did health check-ups of all Balwadi children in which, they suspected Dahid to have a low heartbeat.

At the hospital, Dahid was diagnosed with a hole in his heart since birth. As the child grew older, the hole which was 3.5mm at birth grew to 7mm. The field executive informed the parents about the government health scheme 'Rajiv Gandhi Jeevandayi Arogya Yojana' which could provide them with monetary aid for the surgery. By availing the government scheme, the surgery and total treatment which would have costed Rs. 3,00,000 was conducted at a highly subsidized cost of Rs. 20,000.

This suggests that the Balwadis are a great platform for health intervention and Deepak Foundation saved Dahid from a potentially fatal health condition.



ADULT LITERACY PROJECT FOR TRIBAL WOMEN

The adult literacy project was initiated in the year 2017-18 in 40 villages of Kawant block of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat. The program was supported under the Vikassheel taluka initiative of the government and includes 1875 tribal women as beneficiaries. The goal of the project was to impart basic and functional literacy to illiterate tribal women.

The project enabled women to use net/mobile banking facilities by training them in digital literacy. While basic and functional literacy has been a success, digital literacy is still a challenging goal to be achieved due to the level of illiteracy prevalent in the tribal block.

Paving the way for an equitable future.

SAMAJ SURAKSHA SANKUL

Located in Vadodara, the Samaj Suraksha Sankul is a home for the:

- + Visually impaired
- + Physically challenged
- + Children in need for care
- + After care

It is a PPP venture with Department of Social Justice and Empowerment, under which the physical upgradation, management, and operations have been taken up by the Foundation.

Deepak Foundation has introduced a number of value addition to the program that includes promoting digital literacy, technology based learning for the blind, holistic development, sports, and vocational trainings. The visually impaired children are taught braille, given mobility training, have assistive devices such as smart canes, daisy players, etc. Our students also learn computer using talking software. Sankul is working towards rehabilitating these children in mainstream schools under our Inclusive Education program.

The capacity at Sankul has increased from 36 to 171 boys (aged 8-21) since the last academic year. Clinical psychologists, counsellors, doctors, physiotherapists, and nurses all ensure that both physical and mental wellbeing of the children.

The Foundation's vision at Sankul is to achieve complete rehabilitation of children with special needs into the society. For this, the Foundation is working towards various initiatives such as vocational training for their financial independence, early intervention programs to prevent disabilities and institutionalisation of children, inclusion of visually impaired children in mainstream schools, exposure visits, and participation in competitions to make them socially confident.

STORY OF CHANGE



*"I can't see the stars but I can reach them."

17 years old Smit Patel, resident of Vadodara, was invited by NASA for participating in a Space Camp for Visually Impaired. The camp was designed so that the blind can experience activities like scuba diving and climbing the camper pole, which took the camper to 32-feet in the air and then allowed them to jump. Smit's parents approached Sankul to prepare him for NASA.

It was a proud moment for Sankul to help Smit fulfill his dream. Smit enrolled for a 28 days training, where he was provided with outdoor and indoor mobility training to be able to orient and navigate in unfamiliar surroundings. Consequently, he gained confidence to walk without any assistance using a white cane.

Smit was amongst the 174 campers who were welcomed by the U.S. Space & Rocket Center in Huntsville, Alabama in a week-long program. For the first time, Smit independently stayed in a dorm and had a chance to socialize with his peers. Every challenge that the campers were involved in, from climbing a rock wall to scuba diving, encouraged them to use spacial concepts not often used by kids with visual disabilities.

BETI BACHAO BETI PADHAO



Beti Bachao Beti Padhao (BBBP) is a nation-wide campaign initiated by the central government to prevent gender based sex selective elimination, celebrate the girl child, and ensure their education. It has been implemented by Government of Gujarat in nine districts of the state, where the child sex ratio is below the national average of 918 female children aged 0-6 years for every 1000 male children aged 0-6 years.

Deepak Foundation, in collaboration with Department of Women and Child Development and UNICEF is developing a decentralized, evidence based action plan and detailed road map in six districts- Anand, Patan, Mehsana, Amreli, Rajkot, and Bhavnagar. The overall goal of the project is to facilitate effective implementation of the components of BBBP scheme in Gujarat.



CHILD PROTECTION COMMITTEE

Gujarat State Child Protection Society (GSCPS), Gandhinagar has appointed Deepak Foundation as an implementing agency for formation of Child Protection Committees in Bodeli and Pavi Jetpur talukas of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat. A Child Protection Committee works towards raising public awareness about child rights, child vulnerability, and child protection against physical and sexual abuse. Deepak Foundation has successfully formed 280 Child Protection Committees in the villages of Chhota Udepur district.

The committees have identified 54 children with special needs and 60 children in need of care and protection in two talukas and the list has been submitted to District Child Protection Unit (DCPU) for declaring them legally free for adoption. These committees are also empowering the children and women to use child-line and women helpline.



CORPORATE SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

Enabling corporates become socially responsible



DEEPAK NITRITE LTD.: MILLENNIUM ALLIANCE- PARIPURNA

Project Paripurna was initiated in the year 2017-18 in four villages within Kawant and Naswadi blocks of Chhota Udepur district, Gujarat. The program is supported by Deepak Nitrite Ltd. and includes 6,000 tribal women farmers as beneficiaries. This project involves an innovative concept based on linking agriculture and nutrition to sustainable livelihood. Project Paripurna has won the prestigious innovation grant award of Millennium Alliance for creating nutritious meal mix from locally grown produce, which will help in drudgery reduction, and tackling malnutrition while giving an entrepreneurship opportunity for women farmers who have already been collectivised into two Farmer Producer Companies (FPCs) by the Foundation.

The Foundation is currently supporting the FPCs, for setting up processing units of instant meal mix at village level and in marketing the product to rural and urban areas.

RPG FOUNDATION: JEEVAN AND SAKSHAM

Saksham project was initiated in the year 2017-18 in seven villages in Halol and Kalol blocks of Panchmahal district, and a village of Savli block, Vadodara district, Gujarat. This program is supported by RPG Foundation, and includes 50 rural women and 1,200 primary and middle school children as beneficiaries. It strives to empower the women in the villages by enhancing their income generation capacity through enterprise development, while contributing to improve the nutrition status of 1,200 children in schools. These children are covered under the Jeevan project which focuses on non-formal preschool education, nutritional food, health and nutrition check-ups, and referral to public health centres for medical care.

Five SHGs have been formed and 50 women have been trained on SHG management, institution-building, entrepreneurship, and nutritious meal-making. These women have made close to 1,10,000 nutritious meals for school children. The average SHG turnover is Rs. 48,000 per month. Each SHG earns a monthly profit of Rs. 9,120.



GUJARAT CSR AUTHORITY & DEEPAK NITRITE LTD.: BHARUCH NUTRITION PROJECT



Deepak Foundation in collaboration with Gujarat CSR Authority, and Deepak Nitrite Ltd. initiated a pilot intervention to improve nutritional status of undernourished households. **The project is implemented in six villages: Lakhigam, Ambetha, Suva, Rahiad, Koliad, and Vengani of Vagra block for a period of two years and will impact 12,000 beneficiaries.** The aim of the project is to reduce stunting amongst children and anemia amongst adolescents and newly married couples.

The project's intervention has increased the monthly attendance of specific Anganwadi Centres (AWC) to 80% within a span of six months. Deepak Foundation team mentors AWC workers, and have started various activities like puppet shows, hygiene and healthy eating demonstration using cartoon characters, etc. to encourage engagement of children.

The team has set up help desks to increase the utilization of various government schemes related to health and nutrition by the beneficiaries. **Birth celebrations are organised to track and increase the vital registrations** through which Janmakshar and babykits are distributed. Pregnant and lactating mothers are tracked, so that high-risk pregnancies and under nourished mothers can be identified. School health check-up camps and various nutrition awareness events are organised. 17 adolescent peer-groups are organised under this project, which raise awareness on health, nutrition, and related government schemes.

RESEARCH & DEVELOPMENT

A BASELINE STUDY OF STRENGTHENING THE ROLE OF MEDICAL COLLEGES IN INTEGRATING AND PROMOTING MATERNAL, INFANT, AND YOUNG CHILD NUTRITION POLICY AND PROGRAM

Despite a favorable policy environment for Maternal, Infant, and Young Child Nutrition (MIYCN), last mile delivery of critical interventions has been a sustained challenge in the public health nutrition programs, and is worse in states with poor performance on socio-demographic and health indicators such as Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. Medical colleges are strategically placed in the health care delivery system to lead policy and program advocacy agenda on the '1000-day window'.

Deepak Foundation conducted a baseline study for Alive and Thrive, a knowledge partner to the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, to understand status of MIYCN component in teaching, research, and service provision at medical colleges.

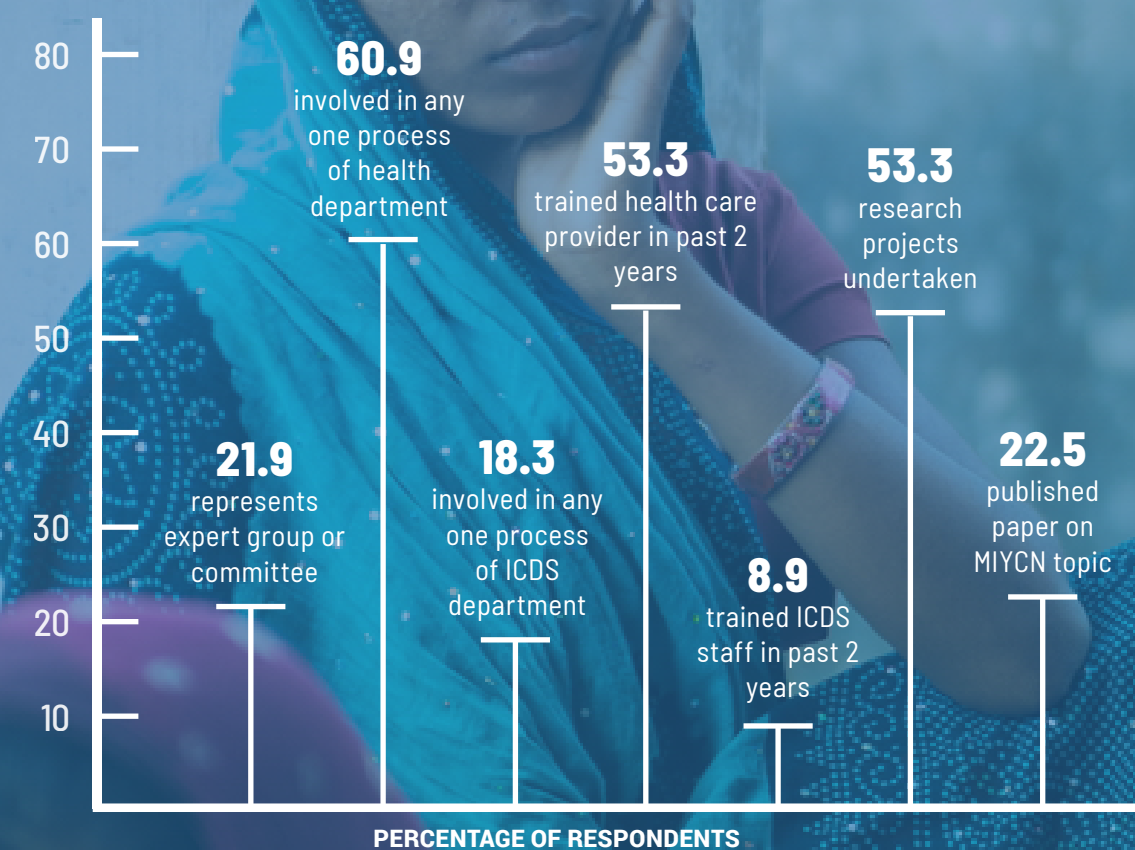
The objectives of the study were:

- + To assess the present degree to which MIYCN is addressed in the pre-service curriculum of medical colleges including the attached nursing colleges.
- + To assess the present degree to which MIYCN interventions are included in the routine delivery of services offered by the Departments of Obstetrics and Gynaecology, Paediatrics, and Preventive and Social Medicine in medical colleges.
- + To understand how medical colleges contribute to research, planning, and implementation of MIYCN programs.

The baseline study was conducted in states of Uttar Pradesh and Bihar covering four selected medical colleges each including hospitals and attached nursing colleges. The study included three groups of respondents: students, faculty and staff, and patients seeking services at medical colleges. A total of 1105 staff and students were interviewed with help of 11 designed tools.

The participants included stakeholders from government (Directorate of Medical Education, State Health Mission, and other departments for advancement of maternal and child health), medical colleges (principal, medical superintendents, and faculties), development partners, technical support organisations, and other stakeholders.

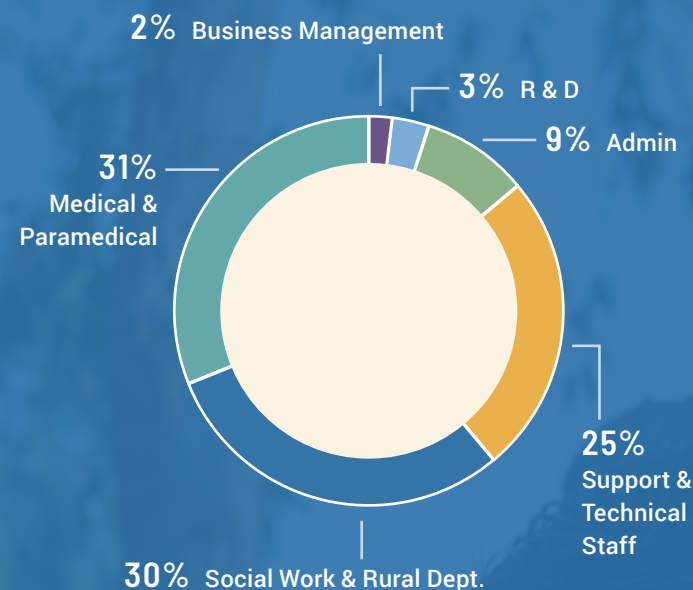
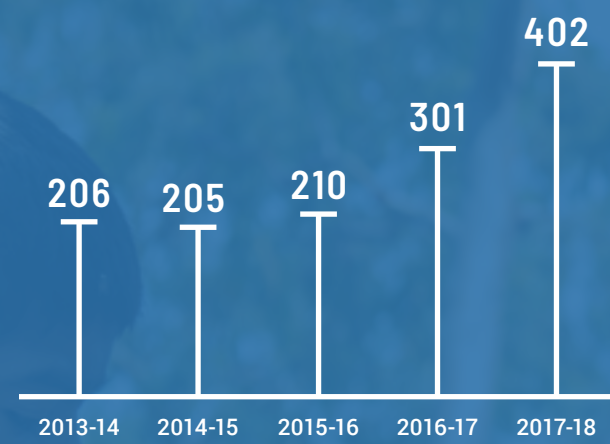

DEPARTMENT WISE EMPLOYEES



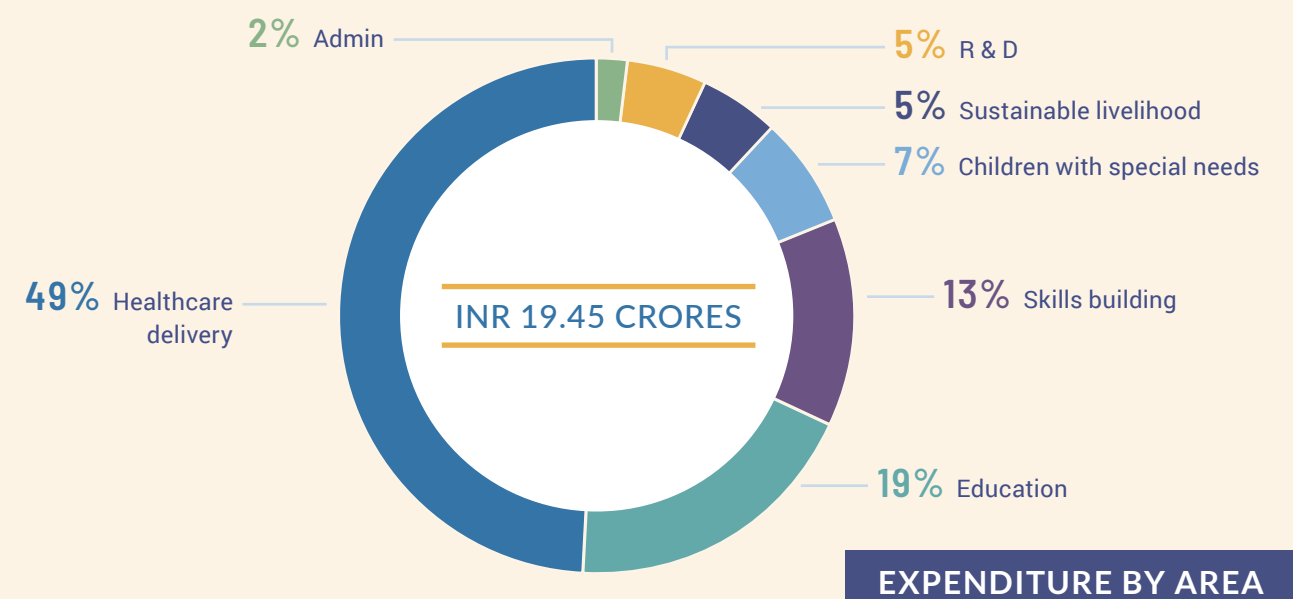
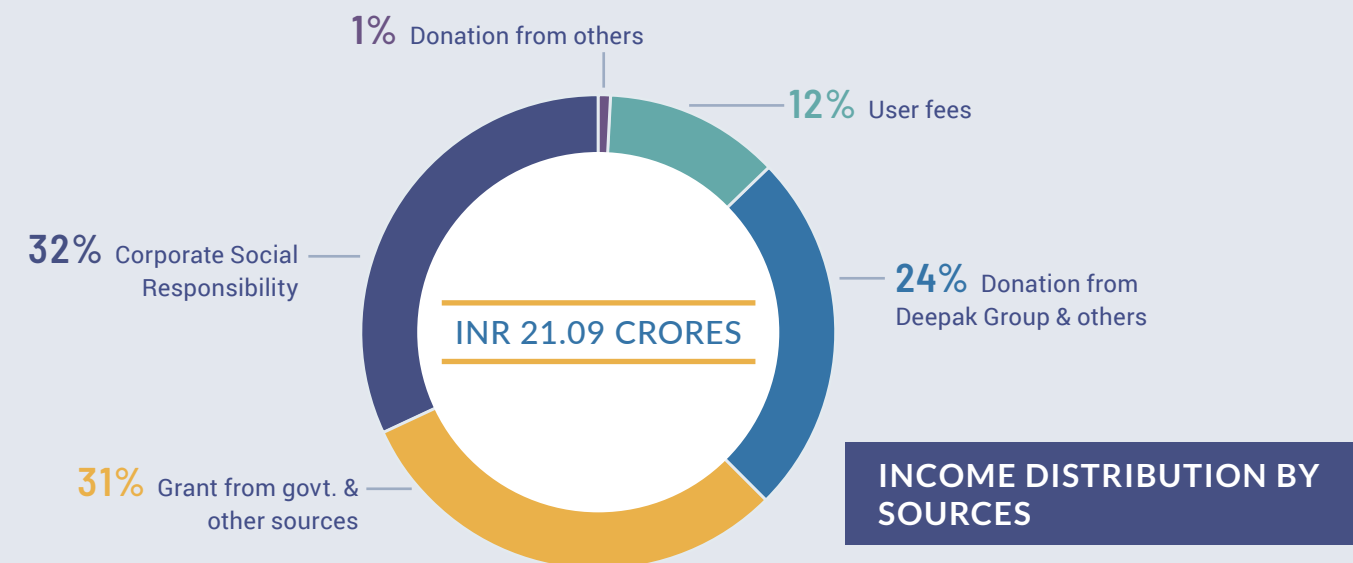

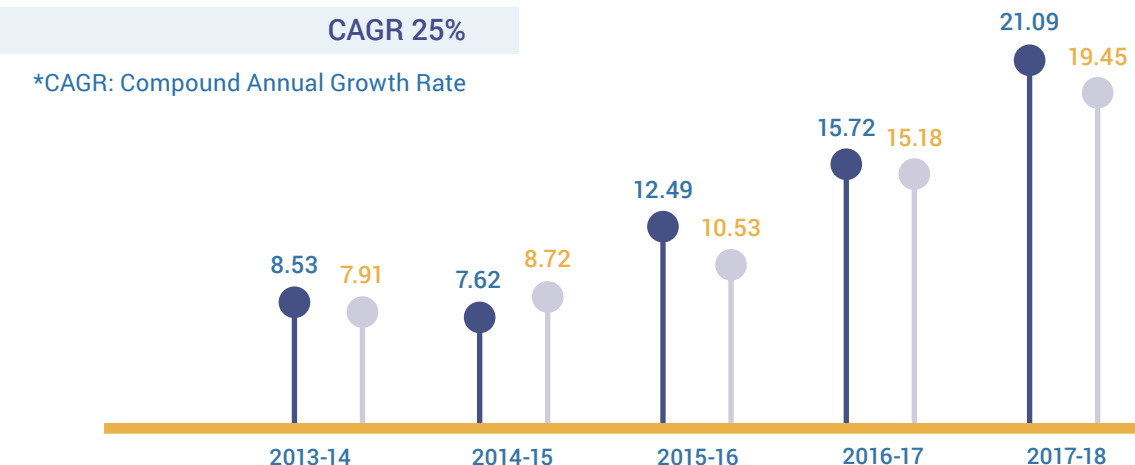
